The Support Plan will be reviewed each term with the child and parents whose own views on provision will be sought. Ways that parents can help at home will also be discussed. Parents will be invited to Support Plan reviews three times a year. A 1 page person profile is also prepared for the pupil which is shared with all staff members working with them.</li> </ul>
What extra support we bring in to help us meet SEND: specialist services, external expertise and how we work together.
